Find out their areas of strength as well as those areas you may need to address before students move on. Consider grouping gifted students together for at least part of the school day. Plan

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for differentiation.

Six Strategies for Challenging Gifted Learners

Passow (1982) states that differentiation is essential for gifted students to develop their unique gifts and talents. “Teachers responsible for these students must have an appropriate base of knowledge and skills to meet these needs, and should enjoy working with these students” (Coleman & Gallagher, 1995, p. 32).

The idea of a differentiated curriculum for gifted children is essential for their learning development. Certain strategies should be followed in order to implement special programs for gifted students. Programs should be devised under Passow's (1988 cited in MacLeod, 2004) 'Would, Could, Should' principle.
